WEDNESDAY AFTERNOON ACTIVITIES

Coventry cathedral (city centre, about 30 minute walk from All Souls; Bus routes 6 and 11). The city has had three cathedrals. The first was St. Mary's, a monastic building, from 1102 to 1539, of which only a few ruins remain. The second was St Michael's, a 14th-century Gothic church designated as a cathedral in 1918, which remains a ruined shell after its bombing during the Second World War, apart from its tower and spire, which rise to 284 feet (87 metres). The third, consecrated in 1962, is the new St Michael's Cathedral, built immediately adjacent to the ruins and tower of the former cathedral, which is a symbol of war-time destruction, but also of peace and reconciliation. Charterhouse London Rd ,Coventry, CV1 2JR. Coventry's Carthusian monastery had its foundation stone laid on the 6th September 1385 by King Richard II and his Queen, Anne of Bohemia. www.historiccoventrytrust.org.uk/visit/charterhouse/

Medieval Coventry self guided tour app www.tours.medievalcoventry.co.uk/tour "Coventry is a contemporary, forward-looking city, with a confidence that is reflected in its bold architecture. Yet peeping out from behind the modern buildings and often catching us unawares as we trek the busy streets, are glimpses of a much older past. These are Coventry's medieval treasures, dotted around the city like precious jewels set amongst a concrete landscape. For every medieval building still in existence, there are many more that have not survived the intervening years." (From the tour Introduction)

The church of St. John the Baptist Fleet St, CV1 3AY The Collegiate and Parish Church of Saint John the Baptist is an enclave of mediaeval architecture in Coventry's mostly post-war city centre. As Saint John's is on the fringe of the city centre, it gets less attention than it deserves. Sir George Gilbert Scott, who restored the church in 1875-1877, considered it 'one of the most beautiful churches in England.' The church was founded in 1344 following the death of Edward II by his widow, Queen Isabella. She had been exiled from public life by her son, Edward III, and when she settled at Cheylesmore Manor in Coventry she began to involve herself in local affairs. She granted the Guild of Saint John a piece of land called Babbalak (Bablake) for building a chapel in honour of God and Saint John the Baptist.

Coventry Transport Museum Millennium Place, Hales Street, Coventry CV1 1JD A museum devoted to British-made motor vehicles in a city famous for its car manufacturers - over 130 have been based in Coventry including Daimler, Jaguar, Rover and Triumph. Until very recently, admission was free! www.transport-museum.com

Explore Hearsall Common Wood, 7.94 ha (19.62 acres) of woodland right next to the church. Hearsall Common has a long history of being common land going back to at least the thirteenth century.

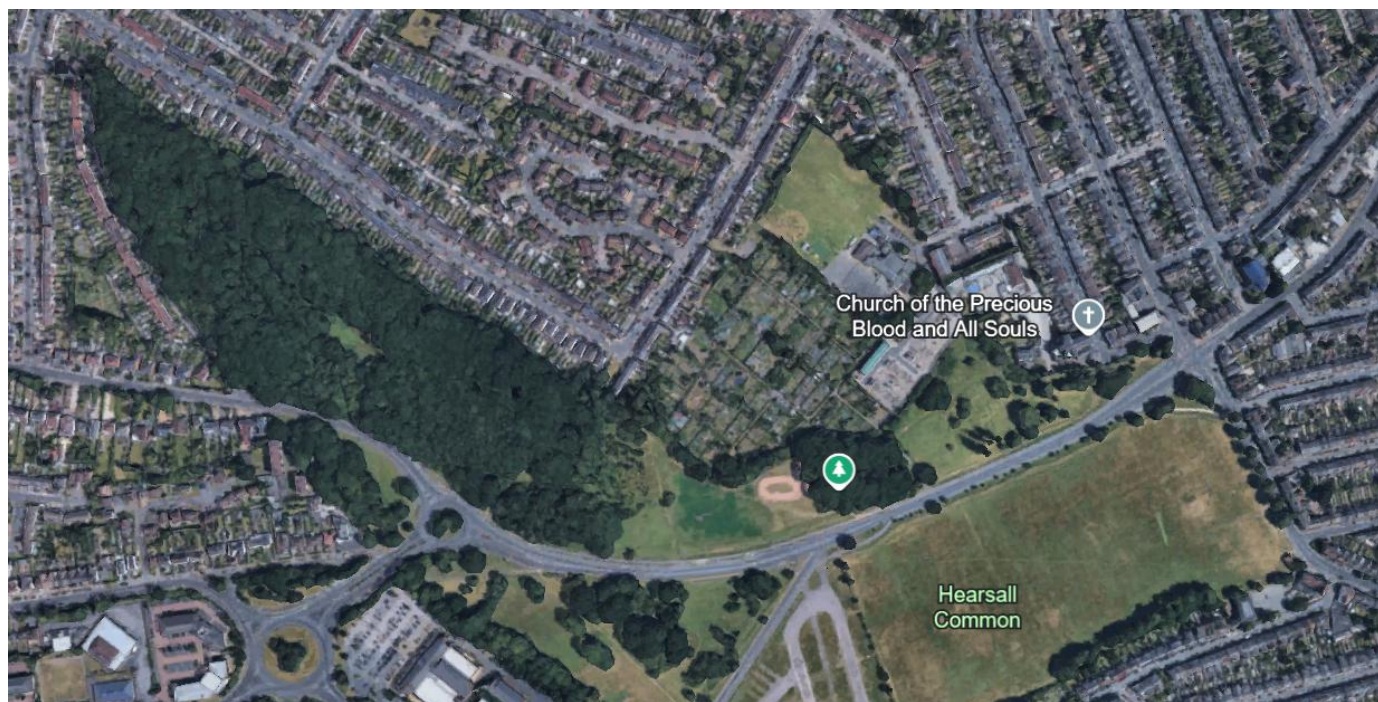
Explore War Memorial Park, Kenilworth Road, Coventry CV3 6PT, about 1 mile from the church. The War Memorial Park is a large park of about 48.5 hectares, opened in July 1921 as a tribute to the 2,587 Coventrians who died between 1914 and 1918 fighting in the First World War. All Souls church was also built as a Memorial to those killed in the Great War. www.coventry.gov.uk/war-memorial-park

Kenilworth is a market town 6 miles south-west of Coventry. A settlement existed at Kenilworth by the time of the 1086 Domesday Book. Geoffrey de Clinton (died 1134) initiated the building of an Augustinian priory in 1122, which coincided with his initiation of Kenilworth Castle. Kenilworth Castle's massive Norman keep dates from the 1120s and the fortress endured one of the longest sieges in medieval English history in 1266. Kenilworth's greatest period began when Elizabeth I's childhood friend, Robert Dudley took possession of the castle in 1563. He spent fortunes turning it into a showpiece mansion to impress the queen. 2025 marks the 450th anniversary of Elizabeth's most famous visit, in July 1575. Near the centre of Kenilworth is Abbey Fields, a public park which covers 68 acres (28 hectares). Abbey Fields contains the ruins of the historic Kenilworth Abbey as well as St Nicholas Church.

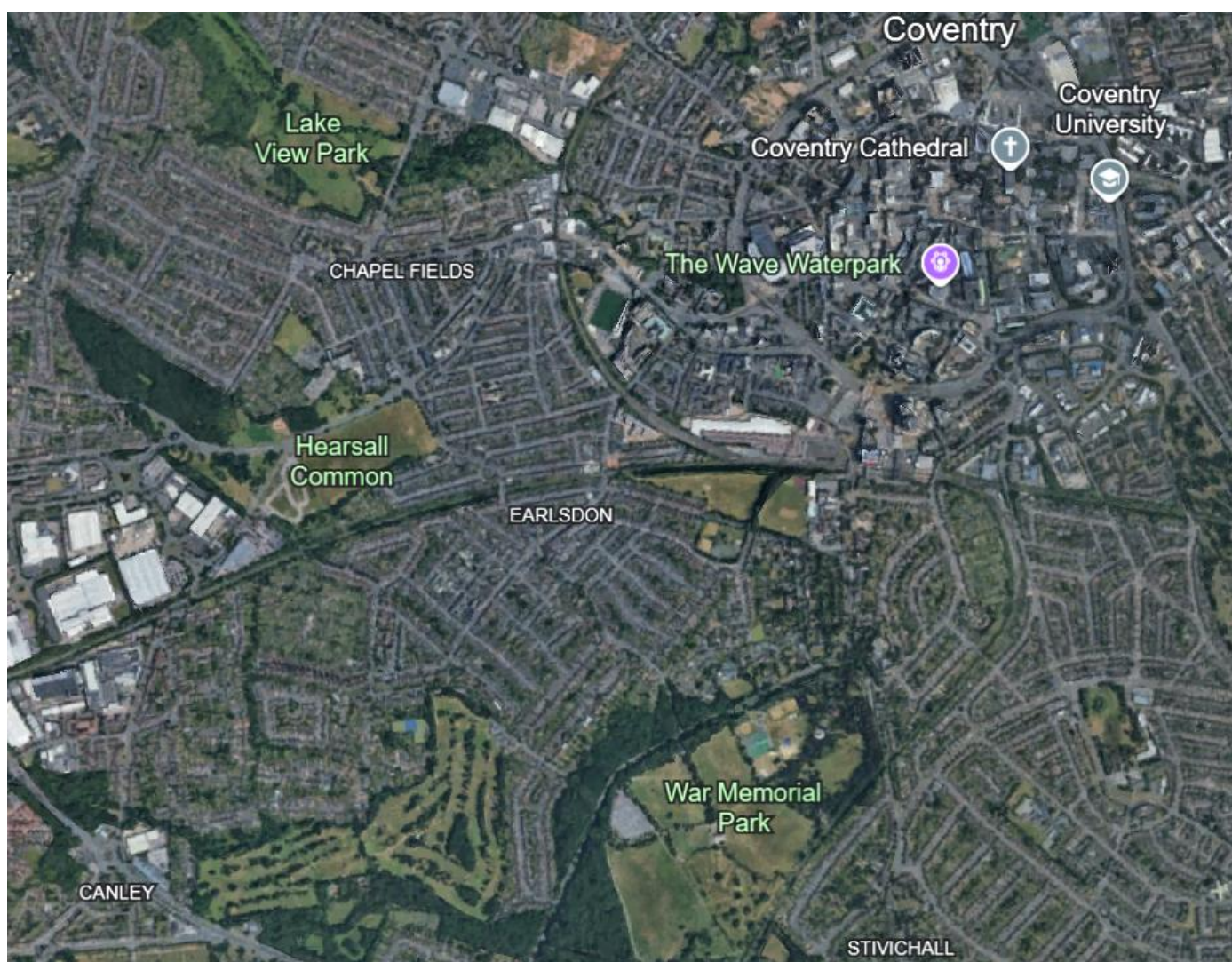
